Towards the end of our visit to India we went to a place called Muttom beach on the Southern coast of India. It was a beautiful beach and we arrived just as the sun was setting so the sky was already turning orange. As we walked onto the beach 3 young men, probably in their late teens, ran up to us. They were very excited and holding a fish - about a foot long, which they had just caught in the sea. As English people we were a novelty and the only white people on the beach and they wanted to have a

photograph taken with us and their fish. It was a happy encounter and just one of many occasions when we were made to feel special because we were different. I wonder how many phones in South India now include pictures of these strange English visitors!

In one of the resurrection appearances of Jesus we find him on a beach with fish. He takes the disciples by surprise, helping them with their catch of fish and then cooking them breakfast. It was a happy encounter and if i-phones had been invented there would have been plenty of selfies taken with their friend who had come back from the dead. Jesus had come back from the dead to overcome death and division. To bring us into a right

relationship with God and to remind us that all people are loved by God and welcomed by him.

In India we felt an overwhelming welcome wherever we went. The fact that we were different was seen as a positive and a reason for a handshake, a conversation and often a photograph. I am not sure we show this welcome in our country. We are often suspicious of those who are different to ourselves and can feel threatened. There is much misunderstanding and mistrust of those of different cultures and religions. I learned many things in India but certainly one of the most important things I bring back is that desire to show God's love and welcome to all. To value difference and diversity and see it as something positive, something to learn from,

something that can enrich our lives and hopefully enrich others as well. Jesus stands on the beach and is reunited with his friends. Yet he also comes

to remind them that God's love is for all and of the need to show love and care to all people.

May we be challenged by him and live for him.

Four of us set off to St Anne's for our District Conference in February. We went early this year so that we had time to visit the White Church at Lytham. It is open to visitors each Sunday and Thursday afternoon and well worth seeing.

Our conference was led by Deacon Denise Creed. It was entitled Reflections on the Cross. We had three sessions:- The palm cross, the cross of nails and the cross of wood.

In the first, we were encouraged to think about being one of the crowd on Palm Sunday, or one of Jesus' women followers. We made origami crosses and found lots of words beginning with p connected to that day. Try it! We managed over twenty. Then we thought about how Hosanna became crucify so quickly.

The cross of nails session thought about different forms of sacrifice and sprinkling of blood. The more blood that touched you, the more you could approach Holy God. "God has given us every good thing and all we have given him are nail marks". We did a circle dance to a Taize chant-


"Remember me, when you come into your kingdom".

In the final session, we sanded crosses and Denise got us thinking about the women of Jerusalem, including the professional mourners, Mary Magdalene and Mary, the mother of Jesus. We sang "I was there when they crucified my son".


We concluded with a moving communion service. It was an excellent conference and we look forward to Denise becoming our District President in October.
